Parish Councillors

Since the last local elections in 2015 it has certainly been an interesting time for the Parish Council. Ten councillors were elected in May 2015 and since then 5 have resigned and 2 new members have been co-opted on to the Council: Louise Rogers and Alison Dean. This still leaves 3 vacancies to fill.

We also have a new parish clerk, Tina Frost Morris, who is doing an excellent job getting everything organised. In September this year, the Chairman also resigned after 6 years of service, so as a temporary measure the Vice Chair has been appointed Chairman until May next year when re- elections will take place.

At this point we would like to thank Mr Andrew Coates for his excellent service to the community during the last 6 years.

Community Grant Scheme

Following the installation of the new Solar farm at Averill Farm, the Parish Council will receive an annual grant of £4,995. This has enabled the Parish Council to introduce a Community Grant Scheme which is available to support any initiatives planned which will benefit the village. So far £1,500 has been given to various organisations including the football club, dance and fitness classes and the Events group.

Following feedback it became apparent that the current application form is difficult to complete, so this will be simplified to make things easier.

We really do want to support initiatives which will benefit the Community, so be imaginative and

New Housing

As everyone knows, a planning application has been made by Harron Homes to build another 81 homes adjacent to the current estate at Oakview Gardens. The Parish Council has registered our objections and notified the Planning Office of our concerns. Further details of the planning application and progress can be found on the NEDDC Planning Applications website.

War Memorial

Notification has been received from Historic England that the war memorial has been listed at Grade II. This is something we should be proud of and recognise the sacrifice made by our villagers during this period. The official guidance upon the cleaning and maintenance of the war memorial recommends that a professional conservation cleaner be engaged, but that cleaning should not be undertaken too frequently.

Morton Village Hall Update



It seems a long time ago when this all started, going back to 2003 when the first meetings took place. Activity has increased in the last twelve months with the Open meetings, Walk-In sessions and regular meetings with the steering group taking place.

The main focus for the Big Lottery fund was the issues the village is facing and how the improvements will help to benefit the residents. Feedback received from residents identified social isolation, disabled access and the lack of youth activity as key issues.

After successfully completing our Stage One application we have been invited to submit a Stage 2 application which was made at the end of September. We should have some feedback in January 2017.

Progress to date

 Big Lottery stage one and two applications submitted.

- The strip of land adjacent to the hall which will enable the hall to be widened is being gifted to the village by the owner of Morton Manor.
- A planning application has been submitted to remove the yew tree next to the hall. This has been approved subject to planning approval for the village hall.
- 4. Fund raising is progressing well and to date we have collected over £1,500 with donations from various sources including Kevin Gillott, the County Councillor, Morton Cricket Club and over £500 from Easy Fundraising. Other fundraising events are being planned for 2017.
- A new 25-year lease has been agreed with the Parish Council and the Village Hall Management Committee.

The Village Hall itself continues to be used by its regulars but would certainly benefit from other activities taking place. Anyone interested in getting involved should contact any committee member.

Morton War Memorial




The Secretary of State for Culture,
Media and Sport adds
Morton War Memorial
to the List of Buildings of Special
Architectural or Historic Interest

Morton War Memorial has been assessed for listing as part of Historic England's First World War Commemoration project and is now listed at Grade II.

The aftermath of the First World War saw the biggest single wave of public commemoration ever with tens of thousands of memorials erected across England, both as a result of the huge impact the loss of three quarters of a million British lives had on communities and the official policy of not repatriating the dead, which meant that the memorials provided the main focus of the grief felt at this great loss.

One such memorial was raised at Morton as a permanent testament to the sacrifice made by the members of the local community who lost their lives in the First World War. Morton War Memorial was paid for by public subscription and the land on which it stands was donated by Miss Gadsby who lived at Church Farm, adjacent to the site.

The memorial was sited in a raised paved semicircular enclosure defined by railings and a low stone wall, mapped on the 1938 Ordnance Survey map. In 1953, money raised at Coronation festivities in the village was donated to the Memorial Committee to provide entrance gates to the memorial's enclosure with stepped access. A bronze plaque which carries the inscription might also have been added then as it carries the Second World War names, and contemporary photographs reveal that the inscriptions were originally incised into the stone plinth. In 2012 the memorial and railings were repaired with the help of grant aid from War Memorials Trust.



Morton War Memorial is an elegant example of the Latin cross type of war memorial displaying a high level of craftsmanship with a Sword of Sacrifice carved in relief onto its front face. The memorial has a distinctive architectural quality and serves as a striking and evocative memorial to the fallen local men.

The List entry for this building, together with a map, has now been published on the National Heritage List for England, and is available for public access.

Listing helps us to mark a building's significance and celebrate its special architectural and historic interest. It brings specific protection so that its special interest can be properly considered in managing its future.

Morton Remembers



Remembrance Sunday 13 November 2016



This year's Remembrance Service included the 100th anniversary of the Battle of the Somme in 1916. The service was led by Rev John Wood at Holy Cross Church and afterwards at the War Memorial in Morton.





The prime minister said the day is not only about honouring the dead but also for paying tribute to those members of the armed forces currently on active service combating so-called Islamic State.

Mrs May said, "The way of life we enjoy today depends upon the service offered by members of the armed forces and their families. Across generations, and in every corner of the UK, today we remember those who gave so much for our values, our democracy, and our nation."



Remembrance Sunday always falls on the second Sunday of November.

The artificial poppy was adopted and popularised in 1921 by Douglas Haig and the Royal British Legion.

In 1947 it was agreed that both World War One and World War Two would be remembered on just one national day, Remembrance Sunday.

There were many fantastic scarecrows throughout the village and the judging took place on 31 October. Prizes were awared for first, second and third places. Many thanks and well done to all involved!







From Revs John & Chrissie Wood

Dear Villagers

We are very pleased to have been asked to write something for the Morton Messenger regarding our recent time in Kumi, Uganda, We travelled on Saturday 24th September and returned on Saturday 8th October. Our flights were from Birmingham via Schiphol to Entebbe and the same in reverse. We landed late at night and stayed overnight at Banana Village which is a very attractive complex with accommodation in individual thatched round houses. Monkeys roam around the complex and this time we saw Mongoose on the site. The following day we waited for other members of the team who after some delay arrived at Entebbe. We travelled by bus with our regular driver, Alex, to an overnight stay in Jinja which is at the source of the Nile where it flows out of Lake Victoria. In the morning, where it flows out of Lake Victoria. In the morning, we were able to have a short boat trip to the marker which says, 'you are at the source of the Nile'. There was a large number of birds including cormorants and five varieties of kingfisher. The most common was the pied but the malachite and pigmy were both beautifully coloured kingfishers. We then completed the journey to the Green Top Hotel in Kumi where, as always, we were greeted with great warmth and affection by the hotel staff. Some of the team were involved in building. Some of the team were involved in building projects, in particular this year the construction of two classrooms and boys and girls toilet blocks at Akubui School. The classroom I helped to build last year had been completed and looked excellent. Although I was not involved in the building work this year I went down one afternoon to meet the head teacher at the school, Samuel He was so welcoming, and all his family as well as other children came to see me. What struck me was this: so often in this country we see pictures of starving children in fund-raising adverts. What he said was less shocking but more profound. He said the rains had not come between April and September. This had meant the crops had failed. There was no surplus for families to sell. Consequently, there was no money for school fees and therefore the children could not come to school. The classes were smaller and the money available to pay teachers was less. It seemed a world away from our talk of pressure on finances.

Chrissie and I, together with another ordained colleague, were providing training to pastors. Chrissie also followed up her work from previous visits in providing mental health training to healthcare professionals. Care for the mentally sick is very poor in Uganda, and the Kumi district is fortunate in having an organisation, founded by a senior psychiatric nurse, Justus Cherop, which has assumed responsibility for the training of village healthcare assistants in mental health awareness. The Teso Mental Health Organisation (TEMEHO) is in the process of becoming an NGO, but is desperately short of funds (no Charity

Commission in Uganda). They have been very grateful for the training Chrissie and a colleague have been able to provide in the past three years. The pastor training began on the Tuesday morning after we arrived. 20 pastors came together and stayed until the following Tuesday. They were all men this time although there are an increasing number of women pastors in the Pentecostal Assemblies of God Church in Uganda, In our introductions, many of the pastors said, I am the husband of one wife and have (however many) children. We realised afterwards that many of them had experience of polygamy in their backgrounds. During the week we developed very good relationships with them and it was a joy to share our experience with them and to learn from them. On the Saturday, we had a day off from training and went with them to a place called Sipi Falls in the foothills of Mount Elgon. It is a beautiful place with three large falls and lovely views over the plane. For the pastors this was a first time to have a day out which was purely relaxation and they loved everything about it. As we came down from a walk around the falls with our bamboo walking sticks they did an impromptu African dance involving the sticks. Great fun to watch! Chrissie and some of the other pastors went for a walk with a local man called Julius who has his own coffee plantation and we were able to buy packs of this beautifully flavoured coffee.

On the Sunday morning, we went to a Church in a rural village. As the bus arrived we were greeted by a crowd of people singing and dancing as they welcomed us to their Church. We were left in no doubt that they were pleased to see us. Later we had a cultural evening with the pastors and members of Kumi Church. Chrissie taught them the Gay Gordons and Strip the Willow and they taught us some African dances. I let go of some of my normal inhibitions and did the 'Turkey Dance'!

Going on these short trips has been a terrific and challenging experience. The travelling can feel very arduous. Protecting yourself against mosquitoes and other insects, as well as coping with the heat, is constantly necessary. However, meeting the people of Kumi is a joy and for us makes the visit so worthwhile. We go out with an organisation called Mission Direct who work in a number of different countries in the world, mainly doing building work (www.missiondirect.org). The trips are two weeks long. Each person pays all the costs of the fortnight and Mission Direct organise all the travel and accommodation. The process involves official meetings with the Archdeacon of Chesterfield following which we have to produce a Benefice Profile and then individual Parish Profiles for each of our three churches. A "profile" is a comprehensive document describing who we are, what we can offer a new incumbent and what we in turn would like from a new incumbent (a sort of church CV). After much hard work by the three church 'profile teams' this document has now reached what is now hopefully the final draft stage and is currently with the Acting Archdeacon for his approval.

Once approved, the document will go to St John's College, Cambridge, who are our church patrons and who have very kindly offered to advertise the vacancy on the internet and in various church publications. We then wait for applications for the position to flood in and then begin the process of interviews and short-listing etc.

So - still a way to go but as the saying goes, "we are getting there".

Our thanks to all who have been and continue to be involved in this process and we will keep you fully informed of future developments.
